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Council supports grant application to expand infrastructure at industrial park

The Crookston City Council is supporting a grant application seeking \$750,000 to help fund the Crookston Industrial Park Infrastructure Expansion Project. The council approved a resolution of support at its meeting Monday, June 15.

Crookston Community Development is seeking the

\$750,000 grant through the Business Development Public Infrastructure Program. The Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development operates the program.

The proposed improvements would extend utilities, streets and stormwater infrastructure to the remaining undeveloped industrial land, creating approximately 65 acres of

developable property.

City officials said the project would support future industrial growth, create opportunities for new development and provide paved access to a new railroad connection. If awarded, the grant could offset approximately 20% of the city's financial contribution to the project.

Revolving Loan Fund application approved

Council members also approved an application for funding through the United States Department of Agriculture's Intermediary Lending Program.

According to city officials, Crookston has received several inquiries from businesses seeking assistance for expansion projects, building improvements, renovations and new ventures. The USDA program would allow

the city to establish a revolving loan fund to support economic development and job creation.

The application seeks up to \$750,000 in federal funding, which would require a 25% local match and could create a loan fund totaling up to \$1 million.

Nature View Development agreement amended

The council approved an

amendment to the Nature View Estates Plat 5 Development Agreement.

The amendment extends by an additional 24 months the timeframe before a potential \$10,000 special assessment may be imposed on certain lots where residential construction has not substantially commenced.

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More than 1,200 trees and shrubs have been planted on the University of Minnesota Crookston campus this spring. Most were planted by service members from Conserva-

University advances climate resilience through planting initiative

The prevailing north and west winds create harsh conditions for people, landscapes and animals in northwest Minnesota. That's why the University of Minnesota planted over 1,200 trees and shrubs on the Crookston campus and Northwest Research and Outreach Center this spring. The tree and shrub plantings strengthen biodiversity, restore and establish windbreaks and support student learning.

The university is "Restoring Our Roots" and improving climate resiliency by implementing a priority identified in its Campus and Climate Action Plans through a large-scale tree and shrub planting initiative.

This effort is funded, in part, by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency as part of its Local Climate Action Grant program. The project brings together a range of partners, including:

- The City of Crookston
 - Conservation Corps Minnesota & Iowa
 - University of Minnesota, including Agriculture and Natural Resources Department, Crookston campus; Facilities Management, Crookston campus; Northwest Research and Outreach Center; Office of Sustainability; and Planning, Space & Real Estate
 - West Polk Soil and Water Conservation District
- These partnerships strengthen regional collaboration around forestry and

climate resilience while expanding tree canopy across both campus and community spaces.

The initiative will restore and expand over a mile and a half of new and restored windbreaks, while working to increase shade, support biodiversity and create spaces that connect people more closely to the landscape. Over time, the plantings are projected to sequester (the process of capturing and storing carbon dioxide) over a million pounds of carbon dioxide over the next 40 years, contributing to long-term campus climate goals for carbon reduction.

"This project puts the Crookston Climate Action Plan into action in a visible and tangible way," said

Shane Stennes, chief sustainability officer at the University of Minnesota. "It supports campus goals for climate adaptation and resilience while also contributing to carbon sequestration through large-scale plantings. Additionally, it reflects the university's commitment to a campus design that prioritizes long-term sustainability and the ability for our landscapes to respond to the changing climate conditions."

About 90% of the species selected for planting are climate resilient or native, helping ensure the plantings can adapt to future climate conditions to support long-term ecosystem health and carbon sequestration.

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City committee reviews funding options to address Houston Avenue erosion

The Crookston Ways & Means Committee continued discussions on the Houston Avenue erosion project and reviewed several preliminary budget items during its meeting Monday, June 15.

Houston Avenue Erosion Project

Committee members received an update on efforts to address ongoing erosion issues along Houston Avenue, a topic that has been discussed at several previous meetings.

City officials reported that a committee has now been formed to help move the project forward. The proposed plan includes three phases: property acquisition, demolition of affected homes and riverbank stabilization. Current estimates place property buyouts at approximately \$1.2 million. Demolition and riverbank stabilization costs are estimated between \$1.7 million and \$2 million, though officials noted those figures could change as additional studies are completed.

City staff discussed several potential funding sources, including a state bonding request and FEMA's Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant program. State bonding funds typically require a 50% local match, while BRIC grants generally require a 25% local match.

The BRIC program is a federal hazard mitigation

grant designed to support projects involving flood prevention, stormwater management and infrastructure resilience. Officials noted the grants are highly competitive and scored through a point-based system. The current application deadline is July 2.

To qualify for grant funding, the city would need to complete conceptual designs, surveys and additional studies. A geotechnical risk assessment was completed in 2024, but additional work remains.

Officials estimated that if state bonding funds were awarded, the city's share could approach \$1 million. Under a BRIC grant scenario, the local share could range from approximately \$500,000 to \$600,000 depending on associated costs. The committee also discussed the city's Special Services District Fund, which currently contains approximately \$3.4 million. The fund was established for levy maintenance and flood prevention projects. City officials reported the city spends roughly \$60,000 annually from the fund while earning approximately \$90,000 per year in interest income. Representatives from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources have indicated the erosion project appears to fit within the intended purpose of the fund.

Council member Dylane Klatt questioned what the total cost to the city would

be if grant funding is not secured. Officials estimated the city could be responsible for approximately \$2 million.

Additional costs discussed included inspections for asbestos and lead, estimated at approximately \$350 per home. Officials also reported that affected homeowners have indicated a willingness to accept less than market value for their properties as part of a buy-out process.

Klatt said he would like a clearer understanding of the financial impact on taxpayers before committing to the project.

Council member Joseph Shostell asked whether a bonding question could potentially be placed before voters on a future ballot.

Officials also discussed relocation options for affected homes, noting only four structures could realistically be moved. Relocation costs were estimated at approximately \$200,000.

As discussions continued, Interim City Administrator Darin Selzler emphasized that delaying decisions would not eliminate future expenses. "Anything we do moving forward is going to cost something," he said.

Budget discussion

Committee members also reviewed several preliminary budget items.

City Hall expenses are projected to increase from \$53,709 to \$115,850, primarily due to capital

The amendment also allows participation in the City's housing tax abatement program.

Council reports
During council reports, council member Wendy Ault extended condolences to Patti Amiot following the death of her husband, Ed Amiot. Ault noted that the Amiot's have long cared for flower gardens throughout the community.

Council member Joseph Shostell also recognized Ed Amiot's contributions to the community, describing him as a "snow angel" in the Groveland Avenue neighborhood because of his efforts assisting with snow removal.

In other matters, Ault said several residents had reported missed recycling pickups and noted that the city calendar contains an in-

correct pickup schedule. She said recycling collection occurs during the first full week of each month.

Crookston Forum
During the Crookston Forum, resident Bishop Jensen spoke on behalf of the Prairie Skyline Foundation, announcing plans for a community time capsule to be placed at 210 S. Ash St. on Saturday, July 4. Jensen said community members are invited to contribute items for the 50-year time capsule, with drop-offs accepted at City Hall from June 22 through July 3.

Bjorn Solberg of Halstad also addressed the council regarding his campaign for Minnesota Senate District 1.

The council recognized June 15-20 as Fraternal Order of Eagles Week through a proclamation.

improvement projects. Included in that increase is approximately \$50,000 for new carpeting at City Hall.

Shostell asked whether local contractors would be considered when obtaining project estimates. Selzler said local businesses would be included in the bidding and estimate process.

Legal expenses were left unchanged from previous

budget discussions.

The budget for ordinances and proceedings was reduced from \$9,000 to \$4,000, while professional fees, which include an annual payment to Polk County, remained unchanged.

Additional budget discussions are expected to continue as city officials work through preparations for the 2027 budget cycle.

Species are reflective of the University of Minnesota Extension Office's Recommended Trees and the expertise of local conditions provided by faculty and the West Polk SWCD staff, and the faculty's current and projected use of the campus trees for hands-on learning.

Beyond species selection, faculty have played an integral role in connecting the project directly to student learning and coursework. Students used the campus as a living-learning lab — collecting field data to update the existing tree inventory, collecting cuttings from the Red River Valley Natural History Area for propagation, participating in campus planting efforts and contributing to the development of an emerald ash borer management plan.

"This kind of work gives students the opportunity to apply what they're learning in a real setting," said Aaron

Rudolph, assistant professor in the Agriculture and Natural Resources Department. "They're able to engage directly with the landscape, understand how management decisions are made and see the impact of their work on campus."

Even the campus' youngest students will benefit from the recent efforts. A tree has been planted at the University's Early Childhood Development Center to provide shade to the play area and to encourage nature-based sensory play. In addition, a nearby apple tree was selected to align with the center's fall curriculum on plants and food systems. As part of this effort, members of the University's Board of Regents recently planted a tree with ECDC students.

Several agricultural assets will benefit from the project as well. Multiple rows of windbreaks have been planted to provide pro-

tection to horse paddocks on the north side of campus and on the NWROC property to provide protection to a cattle barn. NWROC has also planted trees on agricultural fields for soil protection.

The bulk of the planting on campus was completed by service members from Conservation Corps Minnesota & Iowa, staff from the West Polk Soil and Water Conservation District, and volunteers. Conservation Corps members were engaged with faculty to learn more about the campus vision and landscape attributes in addition to planting large nursery stock. West Polk SWCD supported through the machine planting of windbreaks.

In addition to the campus benefits, this project also aligns with the City of Crookston's climate planning and urban canopy goals. A small windbreak added to the Valley Technology Park adds to the city's ongoing Tree Canopy Initia-

tive work in partnership with the University of Minnesota's Northwest Regional Sustainable Development Partnership, which will consist of completing a tree inventory, emerald ash borer planning and preparation, wood waste utilization and urban tree canopy planning and management.

Together, the partners involved in this project have made it possible to improve wind protection, canopy coverage, and landscape resilience. The University of Minnesota Crookston plans to continue the coordination between campus landscape and natural resource management with coursework, student positions and other applied learning opportunities that connect planting, monitoring, and maintenance directly to classroom and field learning in alignment with its Campus and Climate Action Plans.

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Rural Reflections ...

The memories and lessons of early jobs in my life

I see fewer young people with summer jobs. Some would say this is a culture change, others that automation has reduced the available jobs. One local fast-food restaurant has automated their point of sale system completely, which leveraged their ability to make food really quickly. They offer an app that removes the ordering and paying process from humans completely, yet have it hot and ready for drive-through customers.

I recently read an article in the Wall Street Journal (by a Harvard economist) that said automation is a recent phenomena that is decreasing jobs, but summer jobs have slowly decreased since the greatest teen labor-force participation peaked in 1979. The author also said that many teenagers now spend the summer as an intern or with a tutor or any other activity that makes a positive impact on their upcoming fall education.

One factor that stands out is that teenage unemployment has risen by 3% in the last two years. That's enough to create a change even a casual observer will notice, like me.

I have received much of what I am from parents,

mentors, teachers, my faith, friends and the work I performed. Work was really the tool to acquire knowledge from those human suppliers of knowledge and growth with whom I worked. It's also where I created a good portion of my social circle. It's really too bad to miss out on the teenage work experience.

I learned how to work from helping on the farm; I think my best teacher was my brother.

Steve Nelson liked to work; it was his preferred form of entertainment. Steve always made hard, physical work into a game. We would choose one-half of a calf pen to clean and then see who could pitch it out first. While we competed, we would discuss the best technique. Whether to dig down to the concrete in one place and work from there or to remove the straw and manure in layers was a central question.

I think we learned how to work together even as we competed with the other guy. There was only one door to pitch through, so we always talked back and forth about sharing the door as it was in our best interest. Steve has been gone for better than a decade and I remember our work experiences more than any other.

My first off-farm job was in high school when students sold concessions at basketball games. I enjoyed the work as it was physically easy and allowed me to develop my people skills. The

busy times were pre-game and halftime, so there was time to talk with my friends or discuss how much demand there was to re-stock the hot dog carousel. I also learned about perks, I believe we could each have two cups of free pop and a popcorn. I typically chose Orange Crush or tried a mixture or whatever was on tap.

I've never met a good worker that I didn't respect. There are some I didn't like, but I always respected them. As you live life, you learn that respect is one of the few things that you can enjoy without the interference of pride as it is given to you by someone else. It's just one of the things you begin to learn at a job. I hope more teenagers get a chance to find that out and I hope they take it.

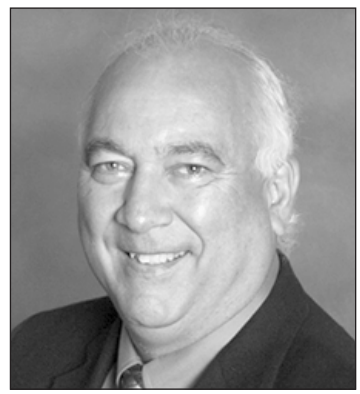

E-Sports and Girls Dual Wrestling approved as MSHSL emerging sports

Two new proposed activities were approved and another was tabled for additional input by the Member Schools when the Minnesota State High School League's Board of Directors met on Tuesday, June 2 for its final scheduled meeting of the 2025-2026 school year.

After more than a year of information-sharing, analyzing data and engaging discussion, the Board of Directors approved Esports and Girls Dual Wrestling as the League's two newest activities.

Esports was approved as a Presenting Partner. The activity is operated through Fenworks, a Grand Forks, N.D.-based technology company that provides after-school curriculum and competitive leagues. The 2026-2027 school year will be a shadow year as League Staff works closely with Fenworks in preparation for the League's championship presentation in 2027-2028.

Under the Presenting Partnership model, the League would be responsible for one championship event, like Robotics and Clay Target. Esports is projected to be a 10-week regular winter season, followed by a regional playoff and then an in-person state championship. More than 100 Member Schools currently report their participation in Esports.

Girls Dual Wrestling was approved into Emerging Status, the step prior to becoming a fully-sanctioned sport. Girls currently participate with boys in League

wrestling programs during dual competitions. Some schools have scheduled girls dual wrestling meets, as permitted by League policy, which currently allows teams to schedule up to eight girls-only events that do not count toward the team limit of 16. The League also sanctions a postseason girls division in the individual wrestling tournament. When a sport is granted Emerging Status, it is a transition phase of two to five years, during which the League studies program stability, logistics and planning for implementation.

Girls Flag Football, organized and jointly operated by the Minnesota Vikings and the Girls Football Advisory Committee, was also seeking Emerging Status for the 2026-2027 school year.

In review of the proposal, the Board of Directors approved tabling the proposal to provide additional time and input from the Member Schools for the purpose of more clearly defining the playing rules and scheduling of contests when it moves into emerging status.

Discussions continue with Vikings representatives to clearly establish the most effective model of the sport should it be approved for Emerging Status. This proposal will be an Action Item at the October Board of Directors meeting on October 2026. In the 2025 season, there were 51 teams and 1,786 participants. During the 2026 season, the number of registered teams grew to 104.
